Training School 2009

Waldringfield Sailing Club is fortunate in being recognised by the RYA as a recognised training establishment to run all types of RYA courses. I have taken over the running of the Training School from Cathy Fish since February 2009. This article is aimed at updating members of the opportunities that will be available during the coming year and beyond.

2009 Programme

By the time you read this, a published programme will be on the training notice board situated to the left of the galley serving hatch. As is the nature of planning courses some will not be confirmed at the time of publication, but the programme will be updated on a monthly basis – so please keep looking.

Some courses will already be full. This is because at the beginning of the year some members will have filled in the training requirements section of their renewal form. These requests are diligently collated by Margaret and forwarded to me. It is only fair that those people take priority, however it is likely that last minute cancellations and vacancies occur so please ensure that, if you wish to take part in a course, please email me at gunfleet@ aol.com Your details will then be held on a waiting list for the next course.

All courses run are all to RYA requirements and successful completion will result in an RYA recognised certificate of competence. Courses fall into 3 main groups.

Dinghy Sailing Courses

These courses cover all aspects of learning to sail from the complete novice to people who wish to improve their sailings

skills. They are tailored to adults and children.

The former begin with level 1 and 2 basic skills and graduate on to advanced courses that cover seamanship, racing and spinnakers.

The latter have 4 basic skill levels before similar advanced modules.

Power Boat Courses

These courses cover all aspects of Power Boats and Safety Rescue boats. They are an absolute requirement for any member to drive a WSC powerboat. The school runs courses as detailed below:

Powerboat level 2 - The course aims to teach and assess all aspects of everyday powerboat handling from towing and manoeuvring to anchoring and handling. It has a theory base as well as a practical session.

Safety Boat Course – As the name implies this course deals with all aspects of safety and rescue as well as advanced boat handling skills.

Offshore shore-based Courses

These courses cover aspects of sailing often associated with bigger yachts and offshore craft. They include:

First Aid

VHF/GMDSS communications

Diesel Engine Maintenance

Cost of Courses

Although the Training School is a service to members it has to make a charge for the courses that are run, however these charges are always well below those made by a commercial sailing school for an equivalent course. These charges may vary considerably dependent on a number of factors:

For some courses the school will need to pay for an instructor(s) to deliver the syllabus.

Certificates and books have to be purchased from the RYA.

Wear and Tear on club boats and equipment.

Petrol and Diesel for the boats.

Grants available from the RYA to promote particular skills e.g. Youth Sailing

It is the objective of the school that its charges are transparent and that the money received covers its costs including the depreciation of its assets, any surpluses are used to buy new equipment or to subsidise future specialist training for the benefit of Waldringfield Sailing Club and its members.

Future Courses

It is my aim to offer any RYA course where there is sufficient demand to cover costs. Possibilities include shore-based courses in the winter for Competent Crew/Day Skipper or Costal Skipper/ Yachtmaster. Other possibilities are a Radar course and the International Certificate of Competence (ICC), the latter required by some European countries for visiting yacht skippers.

Club Training Boats

The club owns 3 Wayfarer dinghies as well as a Lark and a Cadet. If any one wishes to use the 3 Wayfarers (2 are equipped with spinnakers) then please contact me with regard to availability and current status. No charge is made for the loan although contributions to their upkeep are welcomed. The Lark and the Cadet should be booked through the respective class captains.

And finally.....

Congratulations to Ed Harrison on gaining his RYA Senior Instructor Award last month. Senior Instructors are an absolute necessity to running RYA Courses and to now have several 'home grown' SI's is a great benefit to Waldringfield Sailing Club.

Also a massive thank you to Roger Challis who has overhauled, varnished, painted and serviced the 3 Wayfarers 'Lambton Worm', 'Pebbles' and 'India Jade' and trailed them back to the club ready for use, and to Richard Hayward for storing them safely under cover at Old School Farm during the winter.

Project Kraken

Pontoon Update

This is a Crime and Counter Terrorist Strategy with the aims to enhance awareness and share information. What do these words mean. Quite simply the Police are asking all waterside communities such as Sailing Clubs or those living near to the river or coast to be involved and report any unusual behaviour such as people disembarking at night, or cars near to unusual landing places particularly at night. You can register for Kraken, or Police Direct or Marine Watch. All these projects will work together to try and put bits of information together. Now you may think that Terrorism is a far cry from the loveliness of the Deben but a direct spin-off from extra vigilance is that ordinary crime is reduced. Having already been run in Hampshire for 2 years this scheme has proved its worth. A well-used cliché, but that small piece of information passed to them may well be the missing piece of a much larger jigsaw.

I hope most of you will have seen the new plans for a proposed pontoon on the notice board inside the club, listing reasons for and against.

The new position was discussed and debated at the recent Sailing Committee meeting when Class Captains were asked to express thoughts reflecting the views of their class members. Other members of sail com were also asked for their views and voted accordingly.

A vote was duly taken resulting in 8 in favour, 4 against, with 2 abstentions.

The Commodore and Vice Commodore decided not to vote. The OK class were not represented but have sent an email saying they were against.

At the May General Committee this result was reported to them resulting in a general discussion about the pontoon, and it has been decided by Gen Com, in view of the correspondence for and against, the sail com vote and the sensitivity of this issue, to again refer the matter back to the Pontoon Committee for further consideration to explore a possible alternative site.
